





Shell Collection

In late 1999 my wife, Kathy and I did the great sea change to Forster on the Mid North Coast. Moving the old bottle and shell collection took 3 professional moves, a lot of work and planning and we both swore to never move anything again!! In August 2001 I came down with a very nearly fatal dose of cancer, the end result being that I would have to spend months at home rehabilitating and building my body. Rather than just read, I would get something going to occupy my mind and keep me busy. I would buy an old shell collection, the cleaning, relabelling, etc should be just what I need! I would keep what was good and sell the excess. I placed an ad in two local area newspapers and the phone started ringing. That was 8 – 10 collections ago. They were not all good or very large, but some were very, very nice. Every one so far, including the last, was owned by a woman, the most interesting were the wives, sisters of pro-fishermen, back when fishing was trawling.

At this time I was contacted by the Taree Local Collectors Club and asked to join. They wanted me to put an exhibit in their yearly Expo. This Expo runs over two and a half days and is like our Annual Show with Collectors'exhibits and dealer tables and is held in the Taree High School Hall. I refused and kept refusing until by accident I found that two-thirds of the profits goes to cancer research at the Hospital that had just saved my life. I was hooked. I was then and still am the only shell collector. So I put in an exhibit and put out a dealers table to test the waters. Great surprise, had to keep restocking the table and every year it gets better. People come down from past Port Macquarie and south as well as inland. I have made some permanent customers, moving on the excess from the collections is not a problem. Even some of the Sydney Shell Club members have called in here to help me keep the stocks down.

The longest I had to drive to pick up a collection was Wingham, a 40-minute drive. Unfortunately, along with that excellent collection came a plague of silverfish whose tastiest dish is shell labels!

Every year at the Expo I display a sign on the dealers table "I buy old shell collections" and quite a few people take a card for future use since my first in 2001, but what happened lately is unreal.

At the beginning of August I got the following call.

"Mr Reed, I took one of your cards at the Taree Expo a couple of years ago and I wonder do you still sell shells?"

"Yes, I do."

"Well, do you still buy them?"

"Yes, I do, depending on number and quality."

"OK, this was my mother's collection, she passed away about 3 months ago."

"I'm sorry."

"No, not to worry, she had a very good innings, she was 96."

"Had she been collecting long?

"Yes, since she was about 20, continuously."

At this point the hair on the back of my neck started to rise.

"How did she collect them, was there a pro fisherman in the family or a direct source?"

"Well, my father was an itinerant canecutter and handyman and my 3 brothers and sisters used to help her find shells."

"Ah yes, I see." Hairs start falling.

"There was also my uncle, her brother. He was on a Government ship throughout the late 50s – 60s. He used to maintain Government lighthouses throughout the Top End of Australia and right around PNG. He used to collect and buy a lot for her." "Ah, hmm." The hairs are now at full attention, but be cool, very cool. "Well, yeah, sounds alright. Just where is this shell collection?"

"It's at my mother's house, it's in two 7 ft x 4 ft glass fronted cabinets. I have 4 x A4 size photos."

"Are the cabinets in direct sunlight?"

"No, but I only live in Tuncurry, I can be at your place with the photos in ten minutes. Could I come now, I have your address."

I hung up and totally ignored that little alarm bell at the rear of my brain. In ten he was here with four very out of focus photos showing 2 large cabinets jammed to the eyeballs with shells, 14 small drawers under one and 4 large ones under the other. Everything was grouped in lines. All the Volutes here, Cones there, Cowries etc, etc. Sometimes you could make out what an individual shell was by the pattern etc. The Pecten etc were along the back, big Abalones and Pauas, Olives in front, Florida Horse Conch and Tritons, Bailers on the bottom, a hell of a lot of land snails. Also, not an Indo-Pacific collection, but a worldwide one!

"What's in the drawers?" I asked.

"I don't know, some have shells, but I didn't check them all, there are also a few books," he added.

Possibly the drool on the side of my chin was giving me away, so I asked the big question, "When can I have a look at them?" My visitor was in his late 60s and had the look of having bad health. He smiled and dropped the big bomb.

"When will you be in Bangalow?"

"Bangalow, where the hell is Bangalow? Is it in NSW?"

"Yes, just, near Byron Bay, about 6 - 8 hours run from Forster. That is if there is no crash blockage, no roadwork, and no food stops or toilet stops."

I remembered the alarm in my brain. I looked at my visitor, he was still smiling.





"That's why you showed me the photos before you told me where it was!"

He nodded, "Would you have even thought of looking at it if you hadn't seen the photos?"

"Who said I was even thinking of going there to look at it?"

"The look on your face" he replied.

"Can you leave me the photos and come back tomorrow as well as telling me the whole story?"

The collection was left to he and his 3 siblings in the mother's Will and another collection of porcelain and ceramic shoes, 3 cabinets full (300-400 pairs). All this was at the mother's house at Bangalow and the house was to be auctioned on 10 September (and was) and the shells and the shoes had to be out of the house by at least 7 September.

"How much do you want for the shells?" I asked.

"I do not have the slightest idea" was the reply. "One brother and sister live in Far North Queensland and can't help at all. My sister lives in Lismore but she and her husband are ill and she is trying to move the shoe collection and the existing furniture. So it's up to me to move the shells, what do you think they are worth?"

I replied that until I could inspect them I would be a fool to quote an unlikely fair price. "Why don't you pack them up, bring them back here and I'll go through them and give you a fair price. In fact I'll even lend you all my cliplock bins, snaplock boxes plus all padding etc that I use to pick up a collection."

Again the smile, "All those spiky ones and the horny ones (Murex and Spondylus) scare the hell our of me to touch and those egg ones are really fragile (Nautilus). I had my 5th bi-pass 4 months ago and my Doctor would kill me if I lifted boxes of anything. Now, let me ask a question, if it was at my house at Tuncurry and you liked it what would you do?" I answered, "Make you a fair offer and buy it."
"And then?"

"Well, I would pack it up very carefully, bring it home and go through it very slowly and sort it into families. It would then have to be cleaned, oiled, data tags redone and the lot made presentable and bagged. Some I may keep for my own collection but as I really now collect mainly Mitres, only a small section and the rest I would market it as it becomes ready. A lot of work over a long time. It may take 6 – 12 months or longer."

"OK, instead of Tuncurry insert Bangalow and instead of buy, you take it, sell it and give me half, I'll ring you tomorrow" and he walked out.

I sat there with my mouth open for about 15 minutes, I was still not 100% sure of this guy's second name, so it was a great offer. So let's weigh it up. Petrol had just hit \$1.25 and rising, half the nightly TV news was of crashes on the Pacific Highway. I do all the work, etc etc. So what to do, what would you do? What would any red blooded, very damn greedy shell collector do? The next day we were shaking hands on it and a deal was done. I offered to put something on paper, but he would not hear of it.

The whole thing was done on trust, it took 7 hours of solid hard work for 3 people to pack it all and it has taken 10 - 12 days to nearly unpack it. The house sold at auction last Saturday, the shoe collection is still there, the dealer who had agreed to buy them did not turn up.

There is some great material in this, must be when you look at some trawled and dredged material from here and the US and say what the hell is that? Will do an update as I work my way through it.

Yes, Steve, there is some Bursa and John a heap of Pecten, but all have yet to be cleaned and identified. John, your method of rehydration works just as well with tank rainwater.

I have done Cowries dated 1947, 1955 and they come up as if they were taken last week.

Annual Shell Show Report

This years show had an unusual format in that instead of 10 or 11 categories, we had all 78 categories that are to be used for the national show. This was to allow collectors to prepare and exhibit in all their favourite categories, as a practice for the National. It was understood that this meant most categories would have only one exhibit, and many would have none - meaning a lot of first place certificates.

We had two guest speakers one from NSW and one from QLD, and we had the childrens program. This year, as expected, there were no dealers since they are all coming next March for the National, but there were two collectors selling shells.

We were able to use the actual cabinet that will be used to house shell of the show (Category 1) and Favourite Spectacular Shell (Category 68)

There were 14 exhibitors with 53 exhibits in 34 categories. A number of our members were away and some did not want to tip their hand prior to the national, accounting for the reduced number of total exhibits, compared to our normal annual shows.





Door takings were \$255 excluding the raffle, so with rental of two halls, coffee charge, and certificate printing, we still made a profit.

Only some of the shell displays are shown below as the others will be seen again at the National next March.

Ron has found a suitable glass case for Shell of the Show exhibitors. It was suggested that quality engraved pens would be good gifts for judges. The meeting was advised that the shell to be incorporated in the first prize glass cubes was to be *Kapala kengrahami*

Steve Dean gave a detailed talk on Worldwide Busidae This was supported by an impressive display of all species of Bursidae from his large collection, with actual size pictures for the few species and variants he did not have.

Meeting opened 2pm

- 1. It was noted that the 25th Annual Shell Show will be held on the 22nd October 2005 and the President requested more copies of the flyer. The program was printed in the July 2005 "Sydney Sheller" and members were reminded of the opportunity to submit as many displays as possible having regard to the forthcoming National Shell Show in March 2006.
- 2. The Treasurer reported on outstanding membership fees.
- 3. It was reported that several members had attended the field trip to Long Reef that was held on the 20th August 2005 and that a list of shells observed would be published in the near future.
- 4. There was considerable discussion as to whether or not a December meeting should be held this year and it was decided that there be a December meeting on the 10th December to commence at 4:00pm. The meeting will be followed by the Christmas Party that will commence at 7:00pm at the same premises.
- 5. Following the meeting in November there will be a talk on how to prepare labels and exhibits.
- 6. The President reported that he had recently visited Port Douglas Queensland and did some collecting along the coastline. Unfortunately at the time of the visit the tides were unsuitable and there was little to observe. During the stay a visit by ferry was made to Fitzroy Island for the day.

Chris Barnes reported on his trip to Angourie and to other areas along the northern coast of New South Wales.

Ron Moylan reported on his recent fishing trip to the reef on the Queensland coast. Apart from lots of fish, Ron observed several shells including *Murex queenslandicus*, the pulchra and olive families as well as many others.
